

## THE CANADIAN COCHRANE REPORT FOR 1998 Reflections on 1998

As the outgoing director of the Canadian Cochrane Centre it gives me great pride to bow out on what I consider to be a high note. The Cochrane Collaboration (CC) is maturing rapidly as an international organization with an important role to play in summarizing and transferring research on health care interventions to practitioners, patients, planners, and the public. The Canadian Cochrane Centre staff, led by Dr. Kathie Clark, and including Tom Oliver, Shari Beal and Ritz Kakuma, have become a very effective team. Their work includes an increasingly impressive portfolio of activities that support the twin missions of the Canadian Cochrane Network, namely:

- to identify and support local health care experts who wish to become involved as reviewers in the Cochrane Collaboration (CC) and
- to effect local and regional appreciation, dissemination, and application of systematic reviews of health care interventions.

The work of the CC in Canada is carried out by the Canadian Cochrane Network, with sites at all Canadian universities with academic health science centres, and representatives from consumers, health professional organizations, health technology assessment groups, and government. The Canadian Cochrane Network has been very active this year with workshops across the country, including more advanced workshops this year, for people who have signed up as reviewers. The productivity of Canadians involved in the Cochrane Collaboration, as detailed in this report, is most impressive, contributing to the frenetic growth of the CC in 1998. The rate of development of new reviews continues apace, with 481completed reviews (up from 276 a year ago) in the Cochrane Database of Systematic Reviews (CDSR) in Issue 4 for 1998 and 438 protocols for reviews in gestation (up from 283 a year ago). The Database of Abstracts for Reviews of Evidence (DARE) now contains abstracts for 1820 systematic reviews that have been published outside the Cochrane aegis, and the Cochrane Controlled Trials Register now has 218,356 entries. The Cochrane Library (CL) also contains an extensive bibliography on the methodology of systematic reviews and a complete manual for preparing reviews. If you are not already a subscriber to the CL, please check it out - we're sure that you will agree that it lives up to its aim to be the best single source of reliable evidence about the effects of health care interventions. There are now more ways to subscribe to the CL than ever. In addition to the CD, the CL is available on Internet from a number of providers, including <u>http://www.update-software.com/ccweb/cochrane/cdsr.htm; http://www.hcn.net.au;</u> and, <u>http://www.ovid.com</u>.

I would like to express my thanks for the honour of serving the Cochrane Collaboration as the first director for the Canadian Cochrane Centre. I believe that the world is a better place because of the work of the CC and it has been a great joy to be part of its development. I would like to thank the staff of the Canadian Cochrane Centre and my sidekick, Alejandro Jadad, for their loyalty and team spirit during the leadership transition. Finally, I am delighted to be leaving the Canadian Cochrane Network and Centre in the very capable hands of Dr. Arne Ohlsson. I can't think of anyone better qualified, and know that the Canadian Cochrane Network and Centre will thrive with his stewardship.



# THE CANADIAN COCHRANE NETWORK AND CENTRE SUMMARY REPORT

### Introduction:

The Canadian Cochrane Network and Centre (CCN/C) has had a very active and productive year. The detailed activity reports of the Site Representatives, Affiliate Representatives and Canadian-based entities describe and document the work and achievements during the past twelve months. The following is a brief discussion of the results summarized according to our strategic planning issues.

### **Dissemination and Impact:**

One of the primary mechanisms for expanding the accessibility to the Cochrane systematic reviews is through the Cochrane Library. The Sites are expanding the number of subscriptions and their distribution in university and hospital libraries. The use of the Cochrane Library is frequently promoted and facilitated by health librarians. The increased involvement of librarians in Cochrane activities was reported by several Sites this year. The new Affiliate Representative of the Canadian Health Libraries Association, Davida Glazer, will encourage and support the continued recruitment of librarians to work with various aspects of the Network.

The Canadian Cochrane Network and Centre's Internet site features a wide variety of information on the Cochrane Collaboration, abstracts of all Cochrane Reviews in the Cochrane Library, promotional material, downloads, workshops, health links, and more. The website has shown consistently high activity throughout 1998, with an average of 332 visitors per day. This adds up to more than 121,000 visits per year.

In the United Kingdom, the Oxford Textbook of Psychiatry (Gelder, Gath, Mayou, & Cowan) is one of the main postgraduate texts used by those studying for higher degrees in psychiatry. It is currently under revision and includes advice to authors that "contributors may wish to use the current disc issue of the Cochrane Library. A search of the Cochrane Library will yield many systematic reviewers and a large database of references". Similar advice to authors and researchers contributing to Canadian textbooks will be encouraged in the coming year.

Again in the UK, the Department of Health recently published its national Information Strategy for the Modern NHS 1998-2005. One element of the strategy is a National Electronic Library for Health (NELH), and the aim is that this should be accessible through local intranets in all NHS organizations by 2002. The Cochrane Collaboration is an explicitly named element of the NELH.

Late last year Jeremy Grimshaw (Effective Practice and Organization of Care CRG) gave evidence to the UK House of Lords Select Committee on Science and Technology on "Resistance to antibiotics and other antmicrobial agents". The evidence was based on Cochrane systematic reviews and is a concrete example of policy makers use of Cochrane evidence. Policy makers and planners are key targets for the dissemination of Cochrane systematic reviews in Canada. To set the stage for policy makers and planners to use the Cochrane Library, two workshops were held this year to introduce them to the Cochrane Collaboration, the Canadian Cochrane Network and Centre and the Cochrane Library. Another workshop is planned for 1999 which will then be packaged and distributed across the Network so that similar workshops can be held in all regions.

Dr. Ian Chalmers was successful in persuading the UK Academy of the Medical Royal Colleges to endorse a statement for trainees, members and fellows addressing the importance for all doctors of skills in critical appraisal of research evidence and the need for tests of these skills to be reflected in College examinations. The statement also speaks to the role of systematic reviews as a recognized academic/research function. Discussions have been initiated with the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons in Canada to promote a similar endorsement here.

### **Education and Training:**

It is recognized that all levels of health sciences students need to be introduced to the Cochrane Library as one of their primary resources. The detailed activity reports document a variety of projects across the 16 Sites to introduce the Cochrane Collaboration to undergraduate, graduate and continuing education health sciences students.

To date, workshops and presentations have been one of the Network's most popular education and dissemination tools. The activity reports documented that in 1998, 59 workshops, seminars and presentations were offered by the various Network

members. They included educational programs to introduce people to the Cochrane Collaboration, the CCN/C and the Cochrane Library. They also provided training sessions for reviewers.

### **Funding:**

The Canadian Cochrane Network and Centre has appreciated the continuing support of the Medical Research Council of Canada (MRC) and the Conference of Deputy Ministers of Health. In March 1998, a progress report was submitted to the MRC. This fall the CCN/C was notified that two additional years of MRC funding had been granted.

One additional year of funding to support the Network and Centre was awarded by the Conference of Deputy Ministers of Health.

Some of the Sites and Canadian-based entities reported on their funding status and awards this year. The challenge for 1999 will be to seek future funding for the Network and Centre that is stable and sufficient to support the implementation of the strategic plan. This effort will be lead by the Funding Team of Arne Ohlsson, Paul Peloso, Peter Tugwell, and William Fraser.

### **Recruitment and Succession:**

The commitment to consumer involvement in the Cochrane Collaboration is real. The Canadian-based Musculoskeletal CRG has recruited an active group of consumers who participate in the work of the Review Group in several ways. This year they initiated the production of consumer abstracts of systematic reviews which will be posted on the Arthritis Society website. The CCN/C is promoting the involvement of consumers in other Canadian-based CRGs and Fields.

The Recruitment and Succession Strategic Planning Team has proposed that each Site establish a Site Group to assist the Site Reps. with the planning , implementation and evaluation of Cochrane activities. It has been suggested that the Site Groups include representatives of the health professional groups and other Cochrane users in the region. It has also been recommended that each Site Group include a consumer member.

It was decided at the CCN/C Annual General Meeting in November that the Recruitment and Succession Team be integrated with the Education and Training Team.

Several changes in personnel occurred this year. We want to acknowledge with appreciation the work of John Fardy (Memorial Rep.), Milos Jenicek (U of Montreal Rep.), Phil Hahn (Queen's University Rep.), Rosmin Esmail (Back CRG Coordinator), Lorinda Simms (IBD Coordinator), and Ritz Kaukma (Centre Staff). We want to welcome Alba DiCenso (McMaster University Site Rep.), Roger Thomas (Memorial University Site Rep.), Jacques Lacroix (University of Montreal Site Rep.), Tanveer Towheed (Queen's University Site Rep.), Wayne Tucker (IBD CRG Coordinator), and Andrea Furlan (Back CRG Coordinator).

We also want to extend a warm welcome to two new Affiliate Representatives – Davida Glazer, Canadian Health Libraries Association and Carole Repchinsky, Canadian Pharmacists Association.

The most significant change occurred with the resignation of Brian Haynes, the founding Director of the Centre and Network. His vision and leadership has brought the CCN/C to its present stage of development and activity. At the CCN/C Annual General Meeting, we officially recognized the new Director, Arne Ohlsson, who has been the very active and productive University of Toronto Site Representative. Alex Jadad will continue as the CCN/C Co-Director.

### Networking and Linkages:

In order to fulfill its mission, the Canadian Cochrane Network and Centre recognizes it must establish collaborative relationships with groups and organizations who share a common interest in promoting and supporting evidence-based health decision making.

This year we worked with the Heart & Stroke Foundation of Canada who hosted a meeting of key stakeholders interested in improving cardiovascular care through evidence–based decision making. This partnership is important for the development of future strategies to enhance evidence-based health care related to stroke and heart.

End of year meetings with staff from the Institute for Clinical Evaluative Sciences (ICES) and HappIN (Hamilton Area Public and Private Information Network) served to identify areas of common interest and opportunities for information exchange and collaboration.

Finally, CCN/C staff has worked with Pat Kelly, President of PISCES, to explore the feasibility of a national meeting/summit of consumer advocacy groups. Such a meeting would provide an excellent opportunity to promote and disseminate what the Cochrane Collaboration has to offer consumers as well as to recruit more consumer participants to the Network.

### **Future Directions:**

The months ahead will be busy implementing the strategic plans. Critical to our ability to maintain a high level of activity to support the production and dissemination of systematic reviews will be our success in securing future funding.

We look forward to developing education and training opportunities for reviewers, practitioners, policy makers and planners, and consumers. We recognize the need to plan, implement and evaluate the effect of different ways of helping target groups access and use the systematic reviews produced by the Cochrane Collaboration.

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DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY - DR. ROBIN WHYTE

There were 31 paid attendees and, as the meeting was open to undergraduates and graduate students, about an equal number of non-paying registrants. Dr. Alex Jadad was the guest speaker. This was a successful and highly interactive workshop which most certainly identified the Library as an information source and also clarified the routes of access to other sources of evidence-based medicine.</li> <li>The Site continues to offer education specifically on the Cochrane Collaboration and systematic reviews to all undergraduates. Dalhousie University updates the Cochrane Library on its own database which is accessible from the on-campus computers or from remote sites using the Dalhousie Premium Dial Software. This allows faculty as well as students access to the Library both for the purposes of this teaching exercise and for general clinical application. There are some odd features in the access system, in that some of the hospital-based servers are not recognized as "university". A very limited number of clinicians have solved this problem by buying the Library in CD form. A specific goal of the coming year is to purchase a license for general access on the web to encourage browsing at this introductory stage.
