Legislative Authority for the OPHS and Protocols:

Describes the authority for the Ontario Public Health Standards and the incorporated protocols and their respective relationships with the Health Protection and Promotion Act

Glossary for the OPHS:

Includes key terms used throughout the OPHS (the OPHS Glossary is distinct from glossaries included in specific protocols).

Logic Models:

For each standard, provides the relationships between the requirements, board of health outcomes, societal outcomes, and goals.

Literature Searches:

A tool for conducting predetermined literature searches (through PubMed) on topic areas relevant to the requirements.

Referencing the OPHS and Protocols:

How to cite the OPHS, associated Protocols and other resources.

Public Health vs. Medicine

- Focus on populations
- Prevention & health promotion
- Environment & human behavior interventions
- Diverse workforce, variable education & certifications

 Social sciences integral; clinical sciences peripheral to education

- Focus on individuals
- Diagnosis & treatment

- Clinical interventions
- Well-established profession, standardized education & certification
- Clinical sciences integral; social sciences less emphasized


Research Characteristics	Evidence-based Medicine	Evidence-informed Public Health
Study Designs	Experimental studies with control groups (RCTs)	Observational studies
Volume of Evidence	More	Less
Time from Intervention to Outcome	Shorter	Longer

Evidence Pyramid






Complicating Factors in EIPH

- Context is crucial




Public Health Decision Making in Context

Developing a Custom Evidence Tool

Planning Phase

- Objectives
 - Inform program implementation
 - Provide the most up-to-date evidence
 - Promote use of quality research tools
 - Cost effective
 - Minimize barriers to access (registration/login requirements)
 - Integration with existing information tools
 - Accessible to public health community outside of Ontario
- PubMed best match for our needs



Development Phase

- Integration with program standards
 - Analysis of Ontario Public Health Standards
 - Approximately 1 search per requirement
 - 138 search strategies in total
- Scope & breadth of searches
 - Variety of setting, populations, interventions
- Addressing user behaviour
 - Getting the best results on p. 1
 - Minimizing false hits



Release of the Searches

- Go-live date: December 2008
- Supports
 - Instructional guide
 - PubMed tips
 - Customization for advanced users
 - Full text retrieval options
 - Critical appraisal guide
- Raising awareness / promotion
 - Part of OPHS communications plan
 - OPHS & OPHLA websites
 - Training at health unit level
 - Conference presentations: OPHA
