Dr Cochrane: An Innovative Approach to Continuing Medical Education

The Canadian Cochrane Centre, The Cochrane Collaboration and Wiley-Blackwell, publishing partner of The Cochrane Collaboration, are working together to deliver a new online continuing medical education/continuing professional development (CME/CPD) program called Dr Cochrane. Dr Cochrane is one part of Cochrane Learning, an innovative educational environment in which health professionals can continue their professional development. All educational content is based upon high-quality systematic reviews from The Cochrane Library. In the Dr Cochrane initiative, Cochrane Review evidence is integrated with a memorable fictional story and multiple choice questions to provide users with the opportunity to explore and understand the clinical applicability of a Cochrane Review in a new way.

Cochrane Reviews are of high quality and are statistically rigorous, but they can be difficult to read from start to finish. Dr Cochrane transforms the passive reading of a Cochrane Review into a more interactive learning experience to improve the understanding of Cochrane Reviews and change professional behaviour.

Hundreds of people from all over the world participated in the pilot phase of the project with the Italian Cochrane Centre and Wiley-Blackwell. Their feedback encouraged The Collaboration to continue to develop educational

derivatives of reviews. The aims of the Dr Cochrane CME program are to:

- Provide healthcare professionals with the opportunity to access high -quality educational resources contributing to their professional education and development
- Provide accredited CME/ CPD content
- Promote usage of The Cochrane Library for providing 'gold-standard' evidence-based health care
- Encourage learners to identify potential changes in knowledge, behaviour and patient outcomes
- Place patient care at the heart of CME accreditation
- Maintain and enhance the credibility of *The Cochrane Library*

Cochrane Basics 101: A Free Online Learning **Program for Ontario Chiropractors**

The Ontario **Chiropractic Association** (OCA) partnered with the Canadian Cochrane Centre (CCC) for the second year in a row to offer OCA members a free online, selfpaced learning opportunity.

Members of the OCA were given the chance to learn about The Cochrane Collaboration and how it can help them find highquality healthcare evidence. In return, they received five hours of structured credits for continuing education, as outlined by the College of Chiropractors of Ontario. The best part? It could be completed from the comfort of their own home and at no cost.

Those who registered were asked to complete Cochrane Canada's fourpart webinar series, Cochrane Basics 101, along with four corresponding quizzes. Participants were given between 16 April-1 June 2012 to complete all four sessions and quizzes, allowing them to take their time and move at their own pace.

Overall, 209 chiropractors received certificates of completion.

Risk of Bias Assessment of RCTs in Cochrane Reviews

This webinar will correspond with the current guidance published in Chapter 8 of the Cochrane Handbook for Systematic Reviews of Interventions.

You'll learn about using the equityextension checklist, PRISMA-E 2012 (equity.cochrane.org/ equity-extension-prisma), for your systematic review, and you'll be asked to provide ideas and feedback regarding dissemination and knowledge translation strategies.



An Update from the Nova Scotia Cochrane Resource Centre

On 4 May 2012, the Nova Scotia Cochrane Resource Centre (NSCRC), in co-operation with the Research Methods Unit at Capital District Health Authority in Halifax, Nova Scotia, hosted a networking event for health researchers interested in conducting a systematic review. We invited researchers along with local experts in review methodology, literature searching, statistics, and knowledge translation. About 40 attended, and we received great feedback that connections were made between researchers and those with the skills to support their review projects.

From April—May 2012, the Nova Scotia Cochrane Resource Centre hosted a practicum student for the first time: Sarah Visintini, who had just completed her first year of the Master of Library and Information Studies (MLIS) at Dalhousie University. While working at the Centre, Sarah learned about systematic review methodologies, honed her literature search skills and launched the NSCRC YouTube channel (youtube.com/user/ NovaScotiaCochraneRC)! Cochrane Canada Training Survey

Results from a Canadian online training survey, conducted by Erin Ueffing, Education Co-ordinator, Canadian Cochrane Centre, show that there is a significant need for Cochrane training: the respondents are keen to learn about Cochrane methods for conducting systematic reviews.

The survey, which opened on 18 June 2012, aimed to identify the learning needs and preferences of the Cochrane Canada community. For example,

the survey asked whether respondents preferred face-to face sessions over webinars and whether they wanted training at an introductory level or advanced. Over 300 people responded within three weeks.

The key findings were:

Three hundred and seventeen participants answered at least one question on the survey. Most participants were female, with the majority falling between 30 to 59 years of age. A large

proportion was dental hygienists registered with the Canadian Dental Hygienists' Association. Most respondents were new to Cochrane, with 85 per cent having not yet published a Cochrane Review. Forty per cent of participants reported attending at least one form of Cochrane training, and more than half indicated an interest in attending training in the future.


